## Dear Governor Murphy and Legislators:

Pursuant to our responsibilities under Public Law 2009, chapter 45, the Historic New Bridge Landing Park Commission submits this annual report for 2022. 2022 was a year of promise for Historic New Bridge Landing. As a site that continued to provide programming during the pandemic, we were able to shift once again to a full slate of activities for visitors to enjoy. The key to our success is consistently exciting and innovative programming that not only attracts new audiences, but repeat visitors as well. We also offer a unique green oasis just a few miles from Manhattan. Ultimately, with the release of funding that was ear marked for Historic New Bridge Landing, we can begin the process of reimaging the site as we prepare for the 250<sup>th</sup> Anniversary and the critical role NJ played. Green infrastructure, defined entry wars, passive recreation and archaeology of the state owned Von Steuben House are but of a few of our forward thinking projects that are ready to commence immediately.

The park commissioners not only represent local stakeholders—representation on the commission reflecting their respective land holdings within the park—, who know what is best for their communities, but they also provide private professional oversight without compensation from the state treasury.



**A. Teaneck – L.Bauer, Commissioner Teaneck. R.Karp absent.** No report provided.

D.Powell advised there is no signage about "no metal detecting" in Brett Park and asked if we could put the park brown signs could be installed in 2 or 3 locations.

Chairman Smith said the signs in Brett Park look very cluttered. D.Powell lamented that there are Facebook archeological groups that are going around digging everywhere.

E.Pain asked if Is there any value to doing analysis of the signs that are currently there and coming up with a plan of what we think or we can coordinate with that jurisdiction on that property saying this is currently what's there, that we think it should be this and also include the "no metal detecting" signs. Chairman Smith said he thought that was a great

idea. "It's part of the idea when we had the new kiosk put in, to consolidate in a wooden type of structure and have it a nicer appearance. L.Bauer and Chairman Smith agreed to meet.

D.Powell also advised I did notice a post about some a wooden bridge, decking put in Brett Park in low spots. I don't know if anybody else saw that." She asked if we had any recommendations on that from the Commission." "I'd like to be able to do that too. Like we talked about through the Meadow in the low spot. She shared a photo.

Chairman Smith said that brings up a good point, there needs to be more coordination. There was a clean up in Brett Park just before Retreat weekend but the garbage was left there so it was the first thing reenactors coming from across the Northeast saw. I think people's hearts are in the right place. And I'm not trying to downplay that, but it's all about that coordination; if whoever was doing the cleanup, if it would have been brought to the commission or brought to the Teaneck representatives on the commission.

## B. New Milford - Mayor Michael Putrino, Commissioner New

Milford. "Next year is New Milford's 100 anniversary of Incorporation and the 100 anniversary committee was wondering if possibly one night next year we could set up something where we get a tour of the Campbell-Christie House since that is a new type of property originally was from New Milford. We could help fundraise for New Bridge Landing, we could just work together and figure it out. And I did submit my letter of support for the new museum project. Chairman Smith said he would forward to the event committee. D.Powell thanked him for the letter of support and reported she had already sent some out. J. Heffernan asked if they would also like to see the Demarest House Museum since that is also from New Milford.

And if they're going to commit money I just worried about the legality of it, I don't want to put the County in a bind.

Chairman Smith: "Definitely think that there's discussion with the Commission beforehand, but there's also a commission with the society just because, obviously, the way the Commission works and also to the Society having use of the structure and and knowing how it works. You know, I think that all this conversation should definitely come into play before it goes any further for sure." He thanked Deborah.

D.Powell asked "I just wondered if we should have a resolution, I don't know what this what this means really.

E.Pain asked if we should keep it in continuing business or business or something like that? Formal Resolution isn't required at least to keep the topic on the agenda. Chairman Smith agreed..

## G. Bergen County Historical Society – Deborah Powell, Commissioner BCHS

We had another successful event at HNBL, this month for Retreat weekend. The event featured American reenactors marching from Fort Lee to New Bridge portraying events of Nov 20, 1776 (that Thomas Paine wrote about.) Reeactors arriving Sunday approximately 10:00 am, Nov 21. On Sunday we also featured a skirmish that happened Nov 21, 1776 when American attempted to defend the bridge but the British drove them across bridge. I uploaded some video of it to youtube that I shot from the second story window of the Steuben House. We had 9 enlargements of period maps showing New Bridge and BCHS Rev War collections including the 1783 portraits of Washington & Greene and activities for children, we had lots of families.

The new interpretive signs were a big hit at the event. Two volunteers, Scott Sybel & Michael Ginch were able to install 3 of them and two others by Michael Ginch.

We finally received a resolution from the town of River Edge on the new building. She advised she could share it. Chairman Smith suggested could be entered into the record.

Our engineer is proceeding with the permitting with the DEP. She shared the document in Zoom. The costs adds up to \$26,000 and change and costs \$5,000 payment for the engineer. He thought it may go as fast as 6 months. D.Powell said she had second thoughts about asking the Park Commission to pay for

DEP permitting and getting held up, especially with the pressure from the County. Maybe break ground next summer. Per suggestions, D.Powell said she would write a letter to the state to see if fee could be waved or abbreviated. [Funds are being raised by donations]

D.Powell brought up another letter, from last May, a letter from the our engineer to, the Bergen County Board of Utilities, the engineer was waiting for a response so I was hoping you know, to be able to address it with Adam today but I can forward it to him. She shared the letter. He mention needing a response from the BC Board of Utilities for the DEP. Chairman Smith advised this is how the Commission is supposed to function and help resolve issues. "I see no issue reaching out to Adam, hopefully he can facilitate the discussion with somebody, maybe they were away."

We're in discussions with a project manager on putting together a timeline and plans on the new BCHS museum building.

For December events we had planned last fall to do what we did last year in considering the Covid situation and are having outdoor Story & Songs with Linda Russell through the site beginning at the Steuben House with viewable dancers inside but the public outside and ending at the Campbell-Christie House. It's our 38th year and a holiday tradition for people, and estimates we'll have 80 people making reservations.

We also have a Zoom Winter Solstice Christmas readings with Linda on the 17th. It's difficult to plan especially with the indoor activities in the winter but we're planning on doing Pop Up walking tours when the weather is predicted to be warm enough. That could involve opening a building. We've been requiring people to wear masks inside through out situation and limiting group sizes to facilitate distancing.

"I can report that that we had actually over 30,000 reach on our Facebook page for last month. 16,000 of that was alone was a video of the reenactment [from the Steuben House dormer window], people respond to visuals. So you know, it's pretty exciting times for the Historical Society. I'm looking forward to this next year with the new museum building."

The British are coming. November 21, 1776 - November 21, 2021 Reenactment of the Retreat from Fort Lee to New Bridge.

Visitors came dressed for the Rev War event, November 21, 2021.

BCHS Rev War collections / artifacts on exhibit. New donation, portrait said to be Major Baron von Steuben painted shortly before he died.

### VII. Old business

Discussion on protecting the Steuben House porch column from water dripping from roof. Chairman Smith said the idea was to put down landscape fabric to create a barrier between the historical fabric of the soil and then put like a kind of a larger stone so that when the water hits it, it's not going to puddle us quickly and it's going to dissipate and it's kind of it dissipates the water spread this would be the idea behind it. E.Pain discussed investigating the French Drains and conduits behind the Steuben House where water puddles, possibly with cameras.

#### VIII. New Business.

E.Pain said we need to pick a time for next Financial Meeting. Chairman Smith acknowledged he would follow up. D.Powell asked if we have to go before SHPO on the new museum. E.Pain advised " I'm not sure is that true for the new museum building not being as a state property but that can be asked if and when Jim finally makes contact. Maybe that could you know if they ask it could be quickly shown so they see what we're doing and the proximity."

Chairman Smith: There is nothing to report for public comment.

Chairman Smith: I did create a letter I don't know Mike, if it would be better to come up with I guess now with this information to base maybe read just that letter just to show the like Goodwill or intent there on our part or interest. We could rework it a little bit since we've had further conversation with the gentleman. And he seems very willing, which is good, right? There's an amazing account from a German perspective during the Retreat, where they talk about the two stone houses at the bridge that they were basically a fortified in that battle as the retreat is happening to try to stave off the enemy. One stone house is the Steuben House and [the General Store] would have been the other stone house. In the 19th century, Kevin found the documents where they they actually took that down to the foundation [the General Store being demolished] So the original foundation there is from the 18th century. Thanks again, Mike.

C. River Edge – Mary Donohue, Commissioner River Edge. No news.

D. County of Bergen Adam Strobel, Commissioner, and Bergen County Division of Open Space. No report provided.

Just a follow up from my last meeting. Last meeting that I attended. The County did retain the firm to do the design and architectural specifications for the Campbell-Christie House roofing. I don't have any updates Other than

that, waiting for a meeting with with the firm to talk about next steps. And that's all I have.

Chairman Smith: Thank you, Adam. Are there any questions or comments for Adam? Again, I think it's important that whatever we do, you know that there is you know, we haven't seen any, any discussions or proposals on that. I know. This is going on a couple years now and you mentioned previously Elaine Gold presented to the county executive and representatives at the county level, but the Society and the Park Commission hasn't heard anything. So I think that's definitely important. Whatever we do going forward and we need having those discussions. You know, one of the things that I think was was has been brought into past when that roof was put on in the 1970s it's not historically accurate. So if we're putting on that roof again, do we use this is that be then something to to look at a more accurate roof for that for that structure? These roofs can last like 50 years. I guess then any any chance of maybe having the Campbell-Christie house be more historically accurate would delay it further so these are conversations we can have planning in the future.

A.Strobel: I'm sorry. Nothing has taken place. So there's nothing here to say that we've done something and not consulted with you all or something like that.

Chairman Smith: Okay, so it's just a matter of securing funds for the firm is what you're saying?

A.Strobel: having a proposal from the firm, having a contract with the firm and then have the firm do a scope of work, how to progress, and be able to work on the project. Alright. Now we need to have consults with everybody here about what's being planned. If it's if it's not a cedar shake what is it?

Chairman Smith: It would be that the pitch of the roof is in question, when you got the earliest designs that we have. It doesn't seem like it the roof now. If we wanted to really get get into those I guess nitty gritty details, I guess.

A.Strobel: Maybe when moved that change it. [the roof]

Chairman Smith: Yes, absolutely. The roof changed, the chimneys changed, for sure. So I just want to make sure we're crossing our T's and dotting our i's.

D.Powell: There's also a distinction between shake and shingle. And it's actually a shingle roof. Shake is much thicker.

A.Strobel: I did not know that. So definitely appreciate that.

Chairman Smith thanked Adam. "I look forward to seeing that project develop."

I have a fairly short report. Not much to report on the small projects list. I'm told that Mark Texel has been working with senior staff to determine a path forward for the \$1.2 million. I learned there is discussion about trying to get a way to get the commission a bank account. So the money could be transferred directly to the Commission. Rather than have to have me involved every step of the way. I would still have some involvement but it would be simpler to have the money spent. You wouldn't have you wouldn't be unfettered access. There would certainly be protocols that would have to be followed, but it sounds like if that were to happen, it would be simpler. I don't have any updates on the FY 19 or FY 21 appropriations. Unfortunately, we're still at a standstill. It remains the matter of being able to show proof of payment on all the previous expenditures before additional money can be released. So I'm disappointed to report that I don't have any, any information our balance holds at \$6.11. [Since July 1, 2021] While we wait for further information on the brick walkway. One thing I do need to report again, unfortunately, we had a situation at the stupid house where we lost heat and the notification came in at exactly the same time as the scheduled high tide and I took it as there was a small amount of water in the building. Come to find out it was actually a heat alarm. Fast forward a day we were able to go down and identify the problem and we had a contractor. A new HVAC contractor that I just started using

responded on an emergency basis. They did an initial assessment they determined the igniter assembly and the blower assembly both needed to be replaced to the tune of just under \$4,000. The bad news is it's seven to 10 days out before the parts come. That was as of the 31st. So we have been maintaining an on site presence on days that it's been extremely cold. We have three space heaters deployed. One in the basement by the slop sink, one in the restroom and one in the attic in the boiler room where there's a sprinkler head with with no ability to really maintain the heat any other way. on cold days. We've just been. I've been assigning overtime for people that were willing to do it. And we're kind of babysitting space heaters throughout the day. So there's a 16 hour period of the day where those specific areas are roughly 45 to 50 degrees. And then there's a you know, during the day time when the temperatures are rising, we have not been on site. space heaters are unplugged when no one's on site and I'm going to maintain a presence through the weekend. It's it looks like we might get a little luck with some warmer temperatures. And River Edge tends to be a few degrees warmer anyway than Ringwood. But trying to make the best of it. I have a bad situation. I can tell you once the unit is is back up and running. I think I found a very reliable HVAC company. We've had some challenges trying to maintain relationships with companies that have been able to handle our needs. And this company, while not cheap, is exactly what I've been looking for. So moving forward, there shouldn't be a shouldn't be a problem. I believe that unit was installed in 2013. Looking through my notes, so we're disappointing to have those two items fail, but with regular oversight and a company that's familiar with the unit. I'm confident that this won't repeat itself. So that's pretty much what I have to report for this evening. Thank you very much, Eric.

Chairman Smith: Definitely appreciate the communication as well as working with this new contractor. You know, and just moving forward with with the unit so I definitely appreciate your effort. Not only your effort, but the other state employees that are there manning the heat the space heaters and everything so definitely going above and beyond and is appreciated as this situation is being rectified. So thank you very much for that. Are there any other questions or comments Deborah?

D.Powell: What is the name of the furnace company for service?

E.Pain: Limbach. This unit was. That was the comment that the technician made. That he felt that this was over designed and over engineered and just not really finding fault. Just a general statement of fact in his opinion. I think that goes back to originally when it was installed.

D.Powell: I remember hearing that, but it was part of the problem with having to pump the the fluid or the water up to the you know, the essentially the third story so And additionally, that weekend when the heat went off it was like 12 degrees, at least that night so it's warmer than that now.

So the first item, I kind of am concerned about us taking on the responsibility of managing all these projects with going to bid,, reporting on it, how are we going to do that?

E.Pain: Nothing's set in stone yet. And I'm sure when additional details are available. I'll have I'll bring it back to all of us and we'll see what that looks like.

D.Powell: I thought the commission was designed really to take advantage of the different resources within the state, that we wouldn't be maintaining an assistant secretary, we wouldn't be maintaining different staffing like parks person [maintenance], it was going to be integrated into the park service structure. Why would it would be easier if we would be subjected to the same kind of reporting and rules and you're already having trouble with it? How would we know the ins and outs?

E.Pain: I'm hoping that with these meetings are going to be taking place that additional information is made available. I suspect the park and myself or my staff, were always going to have a role in soliciting bids and I don't see them giving you the money and saying okay, good luck. I don't ever see that happening. But, I'll express that concern for sure.

Chairman Smith: Thank you. Any other questions for Eric? None.

## F. Blauvelt-Demarest Foundation – John Heffernan. Acting Commissioner BDF Rep Nothing to report.

## G. Bergen County Historical Society – Deborah Powell, Commissioner BCHS

I was happy that Carol Restivo, BCHS President, was able to attend the Historic State Historic office meeting, the First State New Jersey's comprehensive statewide Historic Preservation Plan. And it was actually the invite came from that Jesse West Rosenthal, a historic preservation specialist too. He was the one who actually came out when we had the Army Corps of Engineers at this site [looking at the wharf and river enroachment bu the Steuben House]. Carol was able to represent us and she was able in one of the committees that divided off, to mention all the things that we are doing at New Bridge, including talking about the walking tours, the Zoom lectures and meetings, the 12-step QR code history challenge and the new interpretive signs so I think we were represented very well.

I can say the museum building is progressing. We received today an invoice for \$24,000 per permitting from the DEP. The building is located on the Historical Society's property and is entirely paid for by donations. The three permits are for waterfront development, freshwater wetlands, stream

encroachment, and our engineer, of course we have his expenses as well. Our engineer told us Adam requested a copy of our submission.

We've had one invoice on at least on snowplowing. Another one with course we'll get if we have something this weekend. But I was able to advertise the site as open on Facebook when somebody made a query about what people looking for something local to do. So I mentioned all those things about the walking tour, or the QR code history challenge and the new interpretive signs. So that got a lot of likes. [12,500 people reached] On the 27th of February, we have the Washington's birthday with dancing in the Steuben House, musicians that we have every year, Ridley and an Enslow on fiddle and hammer dulcimer. And we decided to break it up into smaller performances and so we have smaller crowds. I think we're going to limit to 12 people at a time and require masks as we have and the two other houses open, cooking in the Outkitchen and we'll see how it goes. I don't think we're going to make any money because you know, we can't have that many people in the house [limit numbers of people]. But I think it's important to continue with programming keep people engaged. We have quite a few people coming to us wanting to volunteer at the site. So we we are continuing with our School of interpretation. That's something Kevin started, which was a first for the state from what I understand. We actually go over the history of the site and talk to them about how to give a tour and the history, once a month. It's not just where you're just spouting out a few facts. Volunteers can talk about what people are interested in when they come.

### VII. Old business

E.Pain: The matter of the brick walkway. The land use component. I keep forgetting the new name of that program. So until I committed to memory I'm just gonna keep calling them land use regulation. Looks like there may be some requirements from their office. I'm not sure. After I was the liaison and introduced I took a backseat. So I'm really curious as to what what they may be requiring. And maybe that's to be determined with future conversations between Deborah and their office.

D.Powell clarified she only volunteered to contact our representatives about it.

Chairman Smith: I'd be happy to circle back because I did reach out and explain the project on the news or as I'm going to call them in use right now as well air and so just really what I'm within the same with SHPO was I was really looking for guidance and clarification. So hopefully I can circle back and try to get guidance if this is something that would be necessary or not. Again, when you look at clarification, these are, as I think Eric previously said you know, these are real bricks, they're not paver stones. And a Eric shared it with Land Use that they're not going to set in cement the way the bricks are over the Steuben House this way allows the water to go through it again kind of reduces that are creates surfaces that allows water to move through and I

think that's a real major issue and look at Bergen County today. I mean, just driving around the county, new buildings, large parking lots, and and it's a 20th century idea of getting all this water into storm drains and into streams. And unfortunately as climate change continues to occur, as the Governor has mentioned, we need to look at new ways to solve that, if the commission and the site can can do that, hopefully with with land or with a new design of the parking lot as a way to go forward and show what potentially can can occur in the 21st century. I think it's critical. So I'll circle back on that as well.

E.Pain: The Division of Land Resource Protection.

D.Powell: that's set us back, half a year now and we it's holding up getting the funding because that was the State Department wants to see the paperwork on that. So that you know, it was very unfortunate. I had one is I guess it's old business. Quick question for Eric, if this any other state sites have used Fossil Industries [Interpretive sign fabricator] since we got them into the state system, I was curious if you'd heard heard any other feedback, Eric.

E.Pain: I'm not sure if they have or not, but I can I can do a quick search and hopefully have that information for the next meeting. And if they haven't, they should because they're very good.

Chairman Smith: Air Filter, they were like a 1200 square foot air circulation filtration system type of devices just as a way hopefully I look forward. So I did pass that along to Eric as well.

### **VI. Continuing Business**

### A. Teaneck – L. Bauer, Commissioner Teaneck. No report provided.

L.Bauer "We did apply for the battleship, Battlefield grant, and hopefully we'll be successful this year.

Following up from last month with regard to the metal detectors, that's going to be I think, kind of a large project had reached out to a couple of people within the community. The historic preservation commission in Teaneck with the Greenway with the township in some of the comments back were to survey what other communities are doing from the township from the email that I received back that they think that there's a legitimate interest in borrowing the public from using metal detectors on public land. For the purpose of you know, finding antique articles, and a formal recommendation would be necessary to spark administrative action, which they think would be most appropriate from the historic preservation commission barring entirely does not sound realistic, although they're not sure that this came from the township clerk from an attorney also reached out to the township attorney,

he's going to review what they've got, however qualifying how people can do do it and what to do if they discover something may be helpful. If the commission comes to a consensus regarding the above that I should please forward the information to them and they will then present it to the Council for consideration. While there is an ordinance on the books, there's no real penalties or anything with regard to anything concrete, and that's why I think it's necessary that the different historic groups within our area get together and discuss what they may be doing individually. And if nothing's being done, come up with a consensus of what we should do now that they feel that they can come here and the regulations are one way with using metal detectors and then you go to Teaneck or riveredge and the rules are different or go down to you know any other public area of town stone. Oh, I don't know" he finished. Yep. towns don't coordinate do they?

M.Putrino asked if the State has rules on it. E.Pain confirmed. M.Putrino advised "the best way to do it is to get a copy of that and have it modeled, Teaneck could make that as a template and make it fit for their town. And then what they do is when they pass it, they send it the clerk sends it to all the towns around saying we did this you guys should do it. "Here's our sample. Here's how we did it." And other towns look and say oh, it's a great idea to just change it for their town and they sign off on it and then they adopt it." Chairman Smith said putting up the signs we had made that say no metal detecting and metal fishing would deter people from doing those activities. E.Pain said he thought it is not allowed out except where permitted on a beach.

A.Strobel asked if by putting up signs you're saying there is something here to look for. D.Powell pointed out "they are already they are looking, when Kevin first started here he had a West Point cadet come and show him a cannonball he found in the Brett Park and Kevin didn't know what authority he had it tell the guy you have to leave it with me or or put it back or whatever. So the guy walked off with it. So that's when he talked to Mary."

M.Putrino "Brett Parker is totally owned by Teaneck." He asked "if Teaneck take any DEP money or any Green Acres money for that park, I guarantee you they wouldn't let people metal detecting it."

Chairman Smith "There are YouTube videos where people know what they are looking for. E. Pain said there have been problems in Ringwood area.

Chairman Smith, Thank you very much, Larry. Are there any other questions or comments further?"

B. New Milford - Mayor Michael Putrino, Commissioner New Milford.

I don't have any real updates. I still have not heard back from Mr. McNally. He's the guy selling the old General Store to cemeteries. Just do the DPW I know he's having a lot of trouble clearing out the place. And that place is really really beat up and the structures not very safe. But he told me he would contact me and we will be able to go on there with metal detectors. We'd have permission and maybe do a little dig so we'll see what happens. I have been looking for that General Store sign which he says he's never seen but I said look again.

I don't have I don't know if I have the correct email for Carol I only used what I was able to find on the Society's website." D.Powell said she forwarded the email to Carol [Restivo].

### **Discussion:**

I mean, I guess the only will definitely be happy to accommodate and set up that meeting but I wasn't sure like if we're we should then also have some sort of planning meeting between the society and the county. Because you know when they Christie house was first moved to the site. It's was restore or not even fully restored is put in a 1970s type of look at restoration and I knew there was a previous plans drawn up for the site or for the house. And like as we're kind of like moving forward, if they're going to be if they're looking at like work with the roof. I know, the roofline doesn't like line up historically for the house. You know, is that is this going to be a bigger project to that the roofline could be fixed or that we could talk about further interpretation or how we see the house being interpreted for the next 1015 20 years. Because I guess there's like a new roof goes on. I mean, it's probably like a 50 or \$100,000 for the roof, that any type of you're kind of locking in any future historic interpretation of the house. So I don't know if like, we really never had any of those types of conversations yet. So I'm not sure if that conversation can can began or as like something that potentially could could happen with the house. Guy I mean, just when you look at the house if the night 19th century, you have full porch with a sloping roofline, and this society actually has the original posts in storage for the Campbell Christi

house, which is really neat to see in person, but it's also maybe not the best, ADA accessible. So like you wouldn't there be something that your tie in ADA accessibility to a porch that does add a wraparound porch that could be hidden in into it and then the porch could be have greater access to the public that's there now. So I don't know like just like because originally I think it turned into it was like we were just looking at painting and repairing to like with a full roof which I looking at it now it does look like there's roof shingles that are need to be replaced, for sure repaired. But it potentially could be a bigger project as well. So I just think it would. It's great to have that meeting and then I think we should have a continuation of what the future on that is.

"BCHS had a clean up and made some fence repairs at HNBL on the Eastside last Saturday, April 2. The two boxwoods were trimmed a little and we're doing in stages. They started from clippings Kevin Wright took from 18th century plants at Oxford manor in Warren County. The grounds committee led by Beverley Hashimoto is translating a garden list. They were in French, and plans including a drawing I found in the files of Major General Baron Von Steuben at a museum in New York City. So we're thinking that these could be in the future a basis for planning small, formal garden beds behind the Steuben House. A black walnut was not planted to replace the ancient tree taken down are we waiting for archaeology?" Chairman Smith confirmed this.

"We received some significant donations of Bergen County artifacts from donors. Zabriskie descendants drove all the way from North Carolina to give us collections including an 1838 to jacard coverlet made by I Christie with Tiny Zabriskie her name on it. Then another couple donated another coverlet and both of them gave us other artifacts which we will be exhibiting some of them soon. The Charleville musket as identified by Don Troiani, who is exhibiting now at the Museum of the American Revolution in Philly, was found in front of the Steuben House in 1915 is now with the conservator Gary McGowan at CPR. We very busy with these donations and met with him on Wednesday evening. He's going to X ray at first to see if there is a musket ball or wadding remaining in the musket. There's metal corrosion or rusting and the wood is very fragile and also that's that grant that I received for \$6,000 to do that, and then the society is making up the balance another \$1500. That does not include a case for the artifact.

I shared a request from Adam for the firm to examine the Campbell-Christie House with Carol Restivo, BCHS President. I continue to be concerned about the timing of this project while we were planning the new museum building. We had an update from our engineer and the DEP permitting and that is moving along. The BCHS School of interpretation continues for preparing volunteers to open interpret the historic site and I gave an illustrated zoom lecture on the Campbell-Christie House and the artifacts in it that are on exhibit. I also gave a walking tour at the beginning of March and gave an illustrated talk in person to the Paramus Woman's Club last Tuesday to about 60 women. The DAR is setting up a table for Chwame Gischuch, Under the shad Moon event on the 24th They've also been supportive." D.Powell outlined the event calendar for HNBL.

Discussion on another interpretive sign, D.Powell asked if there was naturalist to advise. E.Pain said he would follow up. D.Powell advised we continue to be approached by Ghost Hunters. Kevin always thought it was a sign of desperation for historic site to go that route but the problem really also is that is that kids want to experience in the middle of the night and try breaking the windows and when they want to experience it and it's just a nightmare." E.Pain noted "More negative attention to your site that you want." Discussion on cleaning the bathroom. She also noted there were big chunk of asphalt in parking lot and wondered if anyone was available to remove it. E.Pain advised a seasonal on his staff could work on those items.

And he this project effectively, just to give a context of a contact and Eric will probably follow the follow up. They contact all their subdivisions. So when we do when you do like an application for land use that message of there's an application goes out to all the different departments is there anything that you division, whatever division respective division have an issue or concern? Then they get you have a chance in terminal to make some comments or questions.

E.Pain: Okay, I support that statement. Same thing for demolitions. If I need to demo the building, the local municipality generates a list of anybody that's within so many feet of the property that give gives them an opportunity to weigh in. So it's very similar with other programs.

D.Powell: Okay, we only heard about it last week, it wasn't requested the initial application. So, you know so it means we're that far behind.

A.Strobel queried didn't your architect advise you of what you would need at this point, I'm assuming they're from New Jersey.

We did have that work done by Chrysalis, the Phase 1A, who would have basically all the information, maybe they just need to regurgitate it into that language, or I'll ask, I'll ask around the fact maybe that even satisfies them unless they need it in a certain format.

E. Pain: Yeah, the one a you don't actually now that with that report, it didn't also look at the different areas as far as sensitivity goes and what has a higher sensitivity rate artifacts and went out. So that would that's that would be very interesting, too.

D.Powell: So how do we proceed? Should I email that to them that I think or ask them if that satisfy requirement?

E.Pain: Yeah, I guess start with the 1A and I will also follow up through this historical community with the state and see if anyone recognizes that language. Then we'll meet in the middle and see what we can determine.

Saturday in case people try to park there or whatever. So I have a new bridge landing and I just wanted this is a you know Bergen County story. Just wanted to thank you again for the venue to the dinner and getting the camera it was it was absolutely an honor. During night really appreciate

D.Powell: I find that very disappointing that they did not let us come and survey that building because we've been very cooperative. We didn't make any fuss or complain about it being torn down. And yet we still could not honor the historic structure with at least knowing about it. M.Putrino: And he [Mr. Vignelli] told me directly the acknowledgement. Yeah, no problem. You guys can do that. I'll let you know. Blah, blah, blah. And that was it. Discussion:

What's the upside? Was it is there a relationship? Is there a strained relationship with sanzaar II or anything or I don't know. Was it just an oversight? Unfortunate oversight? That's me. I know kidneys guys handle a million different things. Yeah. You run the business. He does. Real estate is that no thing so it could have been?

Well, we definitely appreciate, Mike that, you know, you know, going to bat for that, you know, I think that's was still very critical. You know, as Deborah said, unfortunately, but it's really even like just like a larger challenge. We see that the county is facing a lot of pressures with historic sites. And you know, unfortunately, not every site can be saved. They have been requested for not yet but you know, just from rumor mill. It sounds like he's going to make a Kingdom Hall but kind of make it like where you could have weddings there. Because he bought all the properties next home. There's one left and that's the one on the river, which we want to get rid of. Because that house floods we constantly have two persons I guess I guess you want to overweight, we're constantly going out to lift them off. The floor. So the fire department and ambulance corps like we got to get rid of this place. It's a problem. Kind of like the stony hill and he used to own the stony Hill and so I'm thinking he's going to make this like that. I don't know for sure yet. Soon as the plans come in. To our zoning officer I'll let you know. Wow.

Because it's obviously Hey, grab a chair then. That's pretty low that if you can actually build something there, it's like wow, no basements. So he's able to manage with the world's air and without a problem.

But well thank you very much. And I assume to it being that the closer proximity to the site, the state property and we will get a notice anyway like I think there's like how many properties when the museum building that we've had, I actually had to submit it. It's a 200 foot wall, right? Yeah. And it's the very edge of even the property like, far, far away even just our property we had to notify Oh, yeah, he's within 200. So we should get a notice.

# C. River Edge - Mary Donohue, Commissioner River Edge.

## G. Bergen County Historical Society – Deborah Powell, Commissioner BCHS

I followed up with NJSHPO which they acknowledged receipt of the Project Authorization Request for the new museum building. This involved a description of the building, photos, maps, plans. I submitted it June 29, 2022.

Also for NJSHPO, per BCHS request, Chrysalis Archaeological Consultants submitted a Phase 1A for the new museum building and have a Phase 1B visit scheduled for the end of July for the museum building site which involves archeoalogy. Jim and I talked about BCHS arranging for archaeology there awhile ago (2017), to make sure we were not disturbing anything of significance.

I also applied from a grant from PSEG for a solar shingle roof for the new museum. Extensive submission completed near their deadline of June 30.

On Facebook, I posted information on the BCHS cannon that was stolen on May 9, 1980 from in front of the SH. It has been interesting seeing comments, possible leads. Someone sent a great photo of kids in photo sitting on the cannon in the 1970s. When looking at what Reginald McMahon wrote about it, the cannon was purchased to protect Hackensack from another British Invasion in 1812. Someone shared a photo of children in the 1970s sitting on the cannon in front of the Steuben House.

I am nearing completion of another book that Kevin Wright wrote on New Bridge and Bergen County. A hay barrack is mention in events of 1780 at this location so that fits in with interpretation of the site, to reconstruct one at the site. Jim suggested locating it in the meadow.

#### VII. Old business

#### Discussion:

E.Pain: I think still need resumes from a few commissioners? I think I still need Larry, Mary, Mike, and Rich resumes.

Discussion on columns damaged from rain splash from Steuben House roof. E.Pain said he would discuss with Green Meadows using pea gravel or black gravel on top of landscaping fabric.

I mean, I could ask Justin, to give me some examples, maybe take some pictures of something he might recommend. And just go from there, right? I mean, that's not that long, it can't be my threshold, usually \$1,000, some fabric and stone to fill that.

Discussion on tree with poison ivy has not been removed and the ivy has spread.

E.Pain: Chairman Smith submitted a few few suggestions for trees both new and replace some that have not made it I'll see quotes on those.

I reached out to a flooring contractor that's currently certified with the state of New Jersey on the 27th of July I had not heard back the plaster job, I wanted to confirm what rooms and the scope of what maybe we were looking to do and then I'll have the the plaster that I know give us a quote for that. Maybe we can point that out today and then I'll have him visit. I contacted Verizon to inquire about removing the pole. Since I asked them they had since gotten back to me and asked for a picture so I just took a picture and send it back to them. FY 19 project list and budget we're getting very close to the end. We just finished the completion we just completed the pathway that was the last billable item that we were waiting for. And then for some reason, fossil was issued two checks in the same amount so we're waiting on a

reimbursement there were a number of inconsistencies, if you will with the the billing And I'll explain those in a little bit. But we're getting close to being able to submit the report to the Treasury and Department of State to close out the FY 18. And so we can have the FY 19 funds released.

The our kitchen roof, I received one quote, and I awaiting on to other revised, I talked to the contractor today he's aware he's going to update his quotes, probably just to be consistent with the change in cost of materials. The brick walkway is being completed. I've seen it online, I didn't have a chance to look at it in person look fantastic. You know, through a photo on email looks really nice.

And Lan Associates, as soon as the funding is figured out, we're going to be able to get that project started off with it with a kickoff meeting. I guess, since I mentioned that I'm going to do, I'm going to discuss the FY 18 appropriation I had sent an email to Jim and Deborah. We basically started with the 100,000. And you go down through and you you subtract all the different things. There were a couple inconsistencies. I can't identify why the one vendor was paid the same amount twice. And then there was another expense that was paid off of the HNBL account. As best I can tell, it wasn't intended to be taken out of this count who was Green Meadows it was \$1,370 I had no idea. There are people in other programs that sometimes get our bills and account numbers can change. But basically, that was \$1370. And then we had at one point we did some purchases from Home Depot, both in person for lighting and a line for some some barriers, some water barriers, those purchases came to \$1,212.29. So the way I see it is in a HNBL paid \$1370, there's a \$150 difference. I don't know if we are going to be held to that level of detail. I'm almost of the opinion, let's call it a wash and let's move on. If they'll accept that, I'd be I'd be okay with it. So we can get moving with the release of the next ones over \$150 bucks. So let's see how that goes. If we did do that, \$11,008 73.

Chairman Smith: Thank you very much. Does anyone have any questions for Eric?

Discussion on replacing the 12 QR code signs throughout the site, D.Powell reported signs are worn and one missing.

## **F.** Blauvelt-Demarest Foundation – John Heffernan. Acting Commissioner **BDF Rep** Nothing to report. Chairman Smith:

Chairman Smith: Actually, one thing, John just wanted to see if I noticed that the Demarest House, the paint was like peeling on on the eaves that if the BD foundation is aware of that, or they maybe if have any plans to address that. Just that's where we're starting to get ready for the 250th.

J.Heffernan: I'll send them an email and ask him if he's aware of peeling paint.

D.Powell: Do we want to address the water issues there? I think it was advised after the last storm that where we had flooding. And Mike Ginch pumped it out. And I think he installed a new pump, I think he recommended a second pump. You could confer with him first. But he did think that the basement

should be cleaned out so that more debris would not get in the pumps to ruin them. So it's a multi- stage project. We could put a water bug in that building. So we knew if it was taking in water.

Discussion on upgrading the security system at the Demarest House Museum.

## G. Bergen County Historical Society – Deborah Powell, Commissioner BCHS

The Society has monthly meetings for committees that include; event planning, finance, fundraising, museum building planning, and board meetings, and grounds and collections meetings that take place weekly, we have a School of interpretation that Kevin Wright started for training interpreters that we still maintain. We have a robust Facebook presence last month 45,000 reach and outreach of email blasts that reach over 3,000 history constituents and a beautiful website. People still apply for our blue historic markers that are found throughout the County (paid for by applicant). Kevin Wright had built up taking the site from the shutters nailed shut to making this site the highest attendance state historic site in the state. While not being able to continue with the school programming, we do have regular programming where we open up the historic buildings with tours, lectures and activities.

Our Library and Manuscript collections continue to be available at a room in BCC, Hackensack and in addition we answer research queries. We do this all by donations.

Last month I mentioned posting on Facebook about the cannon stolen from in front of Steuben House May 9, 1980. Responses asserted it was thrown off the bridge and alternatively sold for scrap. In the article that made me think of revisiting it, they got the FBI involved. So that's something we can consider doing. I haven't checked with local police yet.

Eric, I wondered if the state had a report on file about the cannon. E.Pain volunteered to make contact with a diver group.

Other site issues include the tavern sign post was not put back yet from the brick work and I also wondered how we were going to address the fence fix for the tavern yard. A good part of a pallet of bricks was left over and it is behind the outhouse. Another issue is that I've been reminded of a few times by society members is the outlet on the Christie Campbell-Christie house Front right of the building needs to be replaced and attached either a fixture holder or attached to the bulkheads to stabilize it, it's just hanging but to work

on it they will need to coordinate with BCHS to turn power off.

D.Powell: I can say that we have not heard back from the state yet on the museum building project. Also the report from the Phase 1A from Chrysalis Archaeology was submitted. The Phase 1B was completed last week and they did not find anything in the 10 test pits, just construction debris.

E.Pain: Regarding Spending: Jim went through and kind of better organized it updated some of the figures. And you know, now what this list reflects are some of the real time needs that we have here. And you know, it really spells out what we're what we're looking to do. And the idea is to, to fine tune this and submit it with the letter for the release of the funding of the 1.3 million. You know, obviously, prices change. I mean, right now, when we look at the current economic situation, I mean, you today I was in the lumber section at the local hardware store. And I was just floored at how much lumber is costing right now it's, it's unreal.

Chairman Smith: So obviously, some of these prices could change. And ultimately to when we hear back from Lan Assc., as well as Grubb when they do the archaeology work, that can change as well. Right. But this is the project list that we've been discussing previously. And really, it's just kind of broken down into different sections. So the first section is looking at the Steuben House and looking at different costs. recently discussed the heating system being added to the list, as well as archaeological archaeological architectural services. The Deborah mentioned as well floral [Formal] garden being brought back to the to the Stupid House property. Moving into general work, just looking at potential pocket park in New Milford, the potential bridge between Christie Christie House and barn benches tree work that's constitute as general. And some of this information will obviously come about from Lan, when they look at the site, etc. We have the area of the wharf, we have a rough idea where archaeology and architectural services for this house and the grounds would cost so that's where you know that some of the numbers come from that. I mean, this could be a much larger number, as well, when we look at whether it's permitting or other type of water work that can double, triple quadruple, maybe plus. So but I think it's good to start thinking about these type of projects in different areas. The tide mill site again, looking at archaeology, potential dendrochronology of the remains the timeline that are their signage, potentially using like the areas of hydro hydropower projects, also kind of a redesign of property, which when we had our initial meetings with Lan, when they first came out for the proposal, which was used for three quotes, etc. That was one of the first things they saw when I looked at

the property and they looked at that area, they're like, oh, this would be easy just to do this, this and this. So there's already a lot of potential there with the bridge, bumper restoration pointed that out in the past as well as I threw in there lighting, you know, some of these areas maybe up lighting on the bridge or something like that could maybe kind of draw attention to their children more. So the landscaping didn't get cut off Campbell Christie house. We actually have of the county had created plans for the addition of a wood east wing addition. So there's the potentiality of adding that if you remember, going back to March of 2020, we sat in the other room and Eric and Adam, were talking about who's going to get which building painted first. And it's like, that's how this whole discussion got started. So that was again 2020. We hold on to the county about painting repairing and Campbell-Christie house. So there's still that funding potentially there that could potentially do that. Moving into the Meadow, again, breaking it down, never mentioned pathway. It is part I think that the master plan, they would have been very common in this region of the colonies in New Jersey, as far as potential more interpretive signage, and even Wigwam or the Native American kind of connection there. The parking lot, again, we need to hear back from Lan, see what they come up with, once we get to the meeting, where you're looking at potential "green" parking lots, split rail fence being added to tie into area.

It came up today, an email about having a gate that could be controlled, so at night, it shuts remotely and closes so that this way prevents trucks. The master plan calls for a monument at Newbridge. Brett Park, we know that again, looking at what the costs would be land is looking at this side of the park. So we have an idea for kind of a design plan or survey for Brett Park. Looking at Brett Park, I know there's definitely emerald ash for damage. There's a large ash is dying. It's expensive to remove trees. But Eric, do you know like, are they doing? Has there been any discussion like with ash trees about like, removing them, or cutting them down and then allowing them to like, create like suckers so that this way, they're actually able to come back that way.

Discussion on removal or leaving ash tree stumps.

Chairman Smith: I think this meeting with Teaneck is so critical. Because you know, there's a potential to spend \$100,000 to Brett Park. So we definitely want to include Teaneck in those discussions and look at the First People is that that would have been happened in that area and recognize really people that have connections to the area.

Overview projects, looking at hydrology, three grading of the flagpole once again, that was a project where the Parking Lot was removed. It wasn't graded at the time. And so that's why we have that comp that issue at this time. Again, Lan supposed to have a look at that. So hopefully that will get addressed. With that. There was a discussion about continuing curbing all the way up to the Campbell-Christie house. I noticed that in front of the Christie house cars parking up, they always do, the commuters are back, which is a good sign that people are back commuting, but now they're back parking on on that area. Additional interpretive signs, and even

security. So on the final page, you know, there's all this would ultimately be put into a draft letter, as we've done in the past projects, which just kind of shows ultimately, the projects can change and evolve, as we've shown that the commission has been flexible, that they can change and evolve. But it's showing that we recognize different areas that are in need of improvement or enhancement, and how we we have already identified areas of enhancement and where this funding can can go. ## **VI. Continuing Business**

A. County of Bergen Adam Strobel, Commissioner, and Bergen County Division of Open Space. No report. Presentation given.

As I've informed the board in the past, we've gone through a process of looking at capital improvements that are necessary for the Campbell Christie house. The county has set aside some capital improvement dollars for restoration of work that

needs to be done for the house. Primarily it's for the roof as well as other exterior items. The county had has retained the services of architect firm Clarke Caton Hintz and hints to help provide an overview and plans that are needed necessary for the house. The roof as was consistent was restored a number of years ago and the roof was put on obviously continuing efforts to maintain the capital investment is necessary. James Giresi with the firm is here tonight to walk the Commission as well as members of the Bergen County Historical Society through his valuation of the facility, making some recommendations that would need to be done for the building. He's prepared to talk about paid samples and materials that will be used for the project. And then we'll provide an overview of what the logical next steps would be to take on this project. We are very aware of the partnership obviously with the Commission and the Commission's and the society's role with the house itself. Obviously, it's an important asset for everybody. So we want to be able to talk to everybody ahead of time, obviously explain what the work that is assessed and is recommended to be performed, but also to get everybody's understanding and provide some input and some answers some questions that you may have, as we move forward with us and talking about the 250. Obviously, we're working around efforts to kind of make improvements as we go forward. Hopefully, all within that timeframe as well. With all the other improvements that we'd like to see at the site. James does have a PowerPoint presentation of a walkthrough. And as we've walked in and he has indicated, what we're going to do is leave the table, get on the other side, put up a screen. We'll run through his presentation and then we'll have some discussion and dialogue. Thank you.

I'm James Giresi with our team Clarke Caton Hintz (CCH) and as Adam just do style the firm. We're retained by County of Bergen to assess document and make recommendations for the exterior repair of the Campbell Christie House (also CCH) including the roof and the exterior envelope. Just to give a sense of our firm. We're located in Trenton. We do work all across the state, mostly with higher education, sports facilities and about 40% of our work is historic preservation. Within the past five years, I've focused mostly on first and second period Dutch vernacular homes, as well as some recent restoration work at neighbor castle for the first phase so we see restoration work very similar to the conditions at Campbell Christie House, day in and day out. And there's nothing a typical in our approach to historic preservation in compliance with the Secretary of Interior standards. That would be any different so I'll only speak to the conditions of the house. I'm sure everybody here is aware of the rich history. It's well documented. So I don't want to spend too much time on that, but will speak to the needs of the house today and in the future. The front facade and a lot of this will be repetitive I apologize as we go around is roof replacement of the cedar shakes. Some minor repair of the mortar at the chimneys, overall repair of the trim work and repainting of the shutters, window sashes and frames and doors and the roof as you can see is weather and it's starting to lose courses of shingle in certain areas as well as there's been something damaged by the uplift of the shingles of the shades across the roof. There is widespread paint

delamination including at some areas of the flat Jack arches. This one in particular has dislocated itself from the underlying structure. These all presented opportunities for water to enter the building. Our goal is to get this building watertight and weather tight to protect the historic finishes inside as well as any collections and exhibits that may be inside. On the rear of the home the addition ship signs of paint delamination at the wood siding and overall the roof it is due to his exposures and a little worse condition. There is excessive biological and vegetative growth on the roof that exacerbates deterioration it'll quickly deteriorate under those moist conditions. On the rear the sidewalls of the dormers are in very poor condition and not permitting water to enter the enclosure. Most likely the entire sidewall the dormer will have to be replaced in kind. We can salvage some areas for detriment repair but due to its condition, it's deteriorated beyond its ability to be repaired. There's also some wood rot at the sills of the windows that will also be addressed. And speaking to the deterioration of the seat or you can see at the pent roof over the rear door how bad that condition is. There will be some live repair. At the corner boards where there is carbon there'll be a woodpecker damage and building. The side exposures of the gambrel roof are in better condition than the dormers and the rear edition. There is widespread painting delamination. And there is some word repair along the trim. Other side elevation is in actually quite good condition requires this minor repair and upkeep to keep the building watertight.

Similar conditions there's widespread delamination as well as there have been previous repairs to the wood trim boards. Our documentation, repairs that so it's a seamless transition between the existing wood anywhere and your new piece would be inserted. The challenges of this project are the construction is cedar shake over open sheathing, there is no solid plywood below the cedar once the cedar is removed by a contractor and exposes the attic to the elements. A contractor that will be working on the project could be experienced in roofs of this nature. However, there's always a risk when you expose the buildings the elements. So there are challenges for access as well as the potential for water infiltration and the amount of dirt and dust that will be generated during this project that could enter the building.

Speaking to the historic paint colors in 1982 and then in 2008 there were multiple paint analysis done. We are matching in our post documents the colors that you see today. These were color matched to the post shear color system. The only change that is proposed is that the front stair which is currently a brighter white is documented in an analysis there should be a little bit more antique white. Change proposed for the exterior. Everything else would remain the same but will be repainted so it's fresh. When I say the word fresh that is a challenge and a goal for the county. The building weathers prior to the 250s when new cedar shakes are installed on the roof, they will appear these will rapidly aging weather in about a year. Year and a half to a more muted in terms of overall schedule. CCH was retained and early 2022. I completed the field investigations in May. We have completed construction documents and technical specifications and those documents have been approved by the New Jersey State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO). As of this time, the goals are to coordinate on the county, the counties and

coordinate with the occupants for site logistics for construction. CCH is working with the county to combine contract requirements as well as assembling pool of qualified contractors to do the work. And due to the poor condition of the roof, we would recommend an immediate start to this. However, due to the cold weather season setting in it's better to hold off until the spring for any construction to start once the weather breaks. So I want to keep this short and focus make make the most of your time but focus on the needs of the building.

Adam Strobel: James is here to answer any technical questions about the approach. Obviously we want to have a good discussion in the dialogue and how we can move forward with with this. There's a heightened concern with questions by all these questions.

Chairman Smith: I guess I'll start this the first time we've heard any type of information both for the Park Commission and the BCHS about any type of proposals or anything that really is going into this. And I just wanted to know was there any thought when the house was moved? And you know, there's a great picture of that obviously, the whole second floor is added. But the roofline is not accurate. So what the roofline originally was before it was made. So, you know, if we're really trying to get it to look like you know, that 18th century style, was there any thought process with that? Also, looking at the front of the house, the two Philco doors, they're not historically accurate. Is there any proposal to have those removed and instead have something that covers the two windows at the lower end to the structure?

James Giresi: So regarding the according to the National Register nomination period significance is recommended is 1750 to 1795 as the period of significance. I know during the 1980s when there was a major renovation done on the building that removed the dormers and porch side. That building as it stood then was a white building with dormers on the front the period the way the building is currently interpreted with the renovations to remove though the dormers wants to early stage of the building's existence in the preservation plan that was completed by far my hope is no longer in existence. As Margaret Hicky, the colors and the styling for the next year in terms of the shutter detailing and the overall appearance within the shutters is what the building can be as close to what it was in terms of the period of significance regarding doors. SHPO has approved the removal of the Boy Scout project at the rear. They did have comments on the Bilco doors on the front of they were original, which they're not they weren't they're not original material, but they are not original to that period of significance SHPO would be amenable to reconsidering that if they if the county wanted to explore those options.

Chairman Smith: That's interesting because in the front there is no entry. And I'm sorry about the exact architectural term but there's no wooden lintel that would have attached to the doors. There's two windows, it looks very similar to the Ingria house that you did and to say candidates that were there in the rear, the architectural firm that the county had hired in the 1970s did actually have door that turned into a Scout

project to actually be accurate to that space. So that's kind of interesting that you're saying SHPO would have that removed, but then to keep the ones in the front that are not historically accurate, it seems to me.

James Giresi continued: I think SHPO is also reacting to the current condition of bilco door. That would be a conversation with the county if it was to be reconstructed in kind. The problem with that is we would be reconstructing a replica already sort of the detailing is lost. There is no documentation of profiles so it'd be an interpretation right from the Bilco door, which in levels of historic preservation, some may see that is too aggressive of an approach to that without having enough historical evidence to replicate it.

D.Powell: These are the two front here are interpretations, aren't they? You know, they're not based on anything. I also wouldn't broach the the, you know, was it ever considered putting, many of these houses had dormers on the front. So was considered. I mean, I know what it does the original roof construction. There's nothing there for you to like, look at what you know from original, but was that considered at all based on your research and the sizes?

James Giresi: For that work in terms of restoration? Prepare a scope of work for restoration is not developed. By CCH as we are retained for the immediate repairs to protect the building from further degradation. If the county was to embark on a larger plan, that would require an update to the preservation plan as well as a much more in depth project but for the project itself in front of everyone here today is how to maintain the building and protect it from the future water infiltration.

D.Powell: We weren't consulted but like Jim said about the roof line and as long as you're going down this road, consider whether we take the opportunity to do it right this time so right this time.

Adam Strobel: You want to put dormers on?

D.Powell: I'm questioning whether they would be would be appropriate to do.

James Giresi: I did not have had drawings which is what we rely on a lot for started documentation. So without having full in depth knowledge of preservation plan, having no further drawings, it is going to be a challenge to present that to the State Historic Preservation Office as being appropriate. If dormers governor's may have existed previously, but without extent knowledge of how it was constructed location, size, window style, it's, it would be a good battle and

D.Powell: But they were actually, correct me if I'm wrong, but they were on the building originally in the Victorian period. So right, so were they replacing earlier dormers or were they a new fixture?

James Giresi: That is a larger in depth research question. But in the period I think we'll compare that with the period significance predates that. Accountability is currently in children. The building is interpreted to the 1750 to 1799 period.

D.Powell: Right. Well, it was constructed in 1774. So 1774 to 1790ish. So dormers, were you know, a feature in buildings at that age.

James Giresi: They were but not necessarily for this house.

D.Powell: You see what I'm saying if it had dormers in the Victorian period did they originally have dormers, I'm just raising as a question.

James Giresi: That is a much further historical research exercise that I could have to undertake or if the Historical Society prior knowledge that I could share with that that's the challenge. It's its conjecture and based upon precedent, which we rely on in the historic preservation profession, but to develop a false history of the site. You it's a fine line, and it's a balancing act of what is the most appropriate presentation of the house and interpretation of the house, as opposed to architectural elements of the period.

D.Powell: we'll put that on the list.

Chairman Smith: are there other questions?

Cindy Piano: The backdoors are original that you're keeping. There's two in the back, right? There are two back here keeping them fixing them today originally,

James Giresi: I did not know that period, but then discovering specifically date to but in the way that the what was printed was restored and reinterpreted in the 1980s and further research and preservation plan. They are to remain.

Denise Piccino: We have water dripping onto the first steps that need to be addressed. that need to be repaired. We've had several problems with that. In the wintertime it gets dangerous, because it freezes and we do have events.

James Giresi: specifically at the stairs here. Our scope is to repair the existing building and stairs as they are or not to replace unless it's completely degraded. Having the knowledge that it is a problem that dripping there are methods of diverting the water. And that will could be reviewed by SHPO. It's a small intervention just over the door not as a larger intervention for water management. But if the county was amenable to cch reaching out to show that I think would be an acceptable resolution for shippers.

Chairman Smith: I think to to your point Denise, the material that was used for the porch rooms repairs also, which was done by the county was interior flooring so it's not made to handle exterior traffic or weather conditions. That's why it's rotting so quickly.

D.Powell: It had to be repaired within the last month.

Chairman Smith: Other questions?

Despina Mexitos: When the house was moved, the original house did have a portico or porch similar to this house.

Chairman Smith: and did there was there was there is some documentation from a postcard in the collection of a porch as well as a side as a kitchen wing.

So the Bilco doors weren't there, but there is a porch right where it's a little bit higher, like if it was a full expand the full length of the house.

And the roofline was over, over the front steps.

James Giresi: So where are the Gambrel breaks? That on? That roof slope was slightly curved, which was typical of second and third period, Dutch immaculate homes, and that then met the trim board on the porch.

Chairman Smith: When the house was originally moved to the site, again, the county had an architect that took the plans for the document or feedback later on. We'll actually look at some of the questions that they also came up with plans for ADA, ADA accessibility, but were not implemented. Is there any discussion about ADA accessibility to the rear of the house or is it standing as is?

James Giresi: There was no site work or grading to make a accessible route to the house? The from my understanding to be accessible? entrance at the rear where there was a restroom added was an attempt to make the building as quick as possible. But there isn't a site similar or related to that. If site support was to be undertaken, that would have to be reviewed with the State Historic Preservation Office. Being that the fact that this building was moved here archaeology may not be of importance to the house but would be of importance to the site in general with the historic properties that are here and the importance of this area with the Revolutionary War and predict that may trigger a larger investigation of phase one or phase one B if anything is found.

Chairman Smith: Ever questions or comments?

James Dusenbury: is it possible because of the dormers on the back end of this house? That That house is not in the right spot, that it should be turned 360 and that

this is actually the back end of the house and you know the size of the front end of the house

James Giresi: without knowing the intricacies of the interior floorplan I would say as a initial gut reaction now being that you have a five Bay on the front end you have smaller windows at the rear, when you look at the symmetry and proportion that is typically defined as the front of the house.

Chairman Smith: Actually just to kind of add to a point on the rear where the again, you referenced the third was the wooden pencil to capture over the door that was originally on site. And on the other side where the county has put in heating and cooling unit. There's also within retail as well as the house which delivered that have a matching entry door on both sides. Yes. So that does and that will speak to being the rear service entry for me to the cellar at that time.

D.Powell: Yeah. Was there any consideration of restoring or improving the fireplaces to be to be usable? Right now we would not use them with collections stored in them. But if in the future, there are no collections there, it could be interpreted, you know, more as a historic house, you know where you would want to light fires.

James Giresi: So being that our scope is limited to just the extra envelope that was a consider because of our firm corrugations does not recommend that especially in public buildings without sprinklers. It's a risk that would have to be evaluated but we would not recommend it to the county.

Unknown: Okay, and then on the roof, then with it being replaced. What are the specs like are you putting down like some kind of solid surface that the roof the shingles gets super shingles get laid on.

James Giresi: it's open sheathing, we're assuming that up to 20% of the open sheet and that is there waiting to be replaced. The Cedar shake is going back is an and split shape with a grade of one quality so it's the highest level of exposure with as little defect as you can get on the shake itself. To go back with ply, you start to alter the building envelope you now create. Kind of you're adding thickness that roof which will add depth to the profile of the aphasia. You also now have a need to put a weather resistant barrier over that roof you can affect the humidity within the space that sold larger building analysis that had to be performed. But open sheeting is approved by the Cedar Bureau and then some of the details that cch follows in your documentation will look just like yes. There's a question in the background. Kenneth.

Kevin Tremble: Thank you Chairman Smith. I have a question. Material. I'm very interested in the material. It's been chosen for the shame. Can you tell me about that?

James Giresi: The cedar shake that's up there will be a red cedar shake. It's hand split.

Unknown: the thickness of the cedar?

Unknown: But it's a five eighths inch?

Kevin Tremble: Have you considered other types of material?

James Giresi: other species of cedar or other species? Now see, cedar is typical to the New Jersey region. Also speaking to material availability, it's a local product speaking locally on the 500 mile radius, which is how supplies are looked at but alternative materials would not from our experience be improved by SHPO.

James Giresi: when whatever material that is available and readily available that matches that historic material, that would be the recommendation I cannot speak for sure. But in our experience would be the recommendation to propose an alternative wood species would go against the existing material that SHPO may have an issue with.

Kevin Tremble: Red Western cedar is not native.

James Giresi. But that's what's so important. I think the colors were I'm changing the color. White Cedar is white cedar tends to celebrate a book and then tends to work right. So let's substitute for white cedar that may well be better might be Alaskan Gold Cypress. So looking at this point in my own, it seems to be an acceptable substitute. So I think you might want to take a look at that as an issue because my understanding is it's a shame as well as somewhat also called better for the security (?). This is what's so I just offer that was a consideration and permission. Thank you, Scott together. I was just curious if they had any photos or anything from from the original state.

Scott Barone: There's a lot of documentation within the society's collection of the move. There are some photographs and postcards. There are some photographs that are more contemporary, contemporary, I believe, can be for early 2000s when a presentation was completed. Put that spoke to the house at a contemporary modern time and speak to the historical images.

Eric Pain: the material on the roof now is in red cedar. I have an example from a building that wouldn't have had asphalt shingles on it would have traditionally been cedar shape. There's asphalt shingles on it. And Historic Preservation Office would only consider replacing it with asphalt shingles currently, and not consider going back to the what is originally there. So I think there's probably something to say for red cedar being on there now. To prove to us the conversation presents itself. They could be approached but it's generally their

D.Powell: So it's sort of funny to use those materials from that period of 1977 rather than look at what maybe it would be appropriate. But I would just like to also note there is a lot of damage all around the house or maybe you observed it but the front door is not in great condition that needs I think restoration or work or replacement. And then you know, I see holes in the wood you know and like Denise said that front porches and has been reworked and is in poor condition really some of that so when you when she you know any wood project once you start opening up things and you know, bigger projects sometimes.

Chairman Smith: The dormers that are added on the back and you pointed out that they're wearing out pretty quickly will flashing be utilized between the dormer and the shingles? And again we see before the rot is worse dripping right down into the into that section. So any diversion plans for area so 20 years from now I'm not having the same conversation.

James Giresi: The flashing material is turned coated steel which is in a couple of material. four cedar shake. When you mix copper you have to now consider the acidity and contributing factors. But the roof bad values as well as sidewalls flashing out over sidewalls will receive new metal flashing.

Chairman Smith: SHPO approved the steel? I'm just asking questions because I haven't seen any of this information. Are there treatments because it's my understanding that some of these groups have the longevity of 50 years have been treated since you're from or recommend any type of treatment every so many years so it doesn't have to be replaced.

James Giresi: there are biocides and fungicides that can be spray applied to the shakes, right? The if it wants to come factory you run the risk of when you cut it in the field. Now expensive and so therefore there's a treatment that was applied. It would have to be done after the fact that they get you a little bit more in in terms of the longevity of the shingle. It's similar to paint in your home. It's a maintenance item right? That has to be applied. So the value of that spread is only as good as how often you apply it.

Chairman Smith: Great. So I think that's a great point because the paint you know, it's there, there needs to be some sort of regular maintenance of going forward as well as budgeted for whether it's paying every two years roof etc. Heating and cooling. Any other questions, comments?

James Dusenbury: Is it all exterior?

Chairman Smith: It's all exterior.

James Dusenbury: So in other words, we're not tackling electricity and all because that's a huge problem. We had a big problem during our Octoberfest for blowing out everything. So I don't know who's supposed to look at that. But if we do all this

restoration on the house, it's no avoid to us if we can use electricity that's in the existing house. I think somewhere online somebody should take the asset to look at what is needed for the proper electricity in that house. Because you've got the air conditioning heat pump and all the sockets around.

Chairman Smith: Any other questions or comments? Actually, one last thing that if we're talking about next year, is there any was there any discussion about changing the exterior light fixture? The House did have a rear wing and that when it was added it was kind of made some blend in but also to be a little bit more modern. And yet when you look at that, that light I mean it's pretty dismal looking fixture.

James Giresi: it wasn't considered if the county was considered an alternative light fixture say small portion of the overall project.

Chairman Smith: I would just say we're taking the other areas very seriously which is a great thing but look at that.

James Giresi: You still unfortunately cannot do anything about the KNOX box.

Chairman Smith: Yeah, the KNOX box is what it is. We discussed that in the recent addition.

Carol Restivo: Just a small comment. But there's a hole in the front porch. We put your wood over it for safety last weekend. It's really bad.

Chairman Smith: I'll make a recommendation that's to be done.

Carol Restivo: Somebody shoe went through it so we put wood down for safety of it happening during the event.

Chairman Smith: questions?

Despina Mexitos: Yes, yeah, I think that's why I kept bringing up the antique porch that was originally on the structure because it will solve a lot of these problems with the water coming right onto the stoop and all and going down by the window. That's what those porches were for. And if it originally had one, you can solve it with just extending the roof the way it was originally. To a portico. I don't know if they felt that this was true by finishing the house without the build up towards you say that we've done something there.

Chairman Smith: Do you know what the date is?

James Giresi: The right house dates at 1810, The Hamilton Van Riper house at 1815, the Van Allen house 1760, Garretson 1720 (?). So the top two like houses have you ever in a time period as well as the Freelyn House which actually it's a very similar

history to give up Campbell-Christie it was relocated to a new site, how it was interpreted to listen the earliest period and put up the wing.

Adam Strobel: The house was removed in 1977 days and they decided not to put up a large renovation.

James Giresi: I believe to fix in the 80s is when that the period the site was interpreted as it stands today and really at that period of time. I don't have documentation of what pieces were individually put back into the 70s but how it was interpreted in the restoration rehabilitation in the 80s was what to the dormers and other features.

Adam Strobel: So when the house was built in '77 So we're saying the restoration between successive part of the process.

James Giresi: this is probably this was like a follow up after to redo plaster moving houses create damaging process. I think there's no

Kevin Tremble: I own a house from 1790 and you have to use photographs as some sort of reference.

Deborah Powell: did the county do any archaeology at the site where this house stood? Or did you find records?I

James Giresi: I don't know if they exist or not? But I did not see it

Kevin Tremble: do any research specifically. That's your that's Kevin dissuading. Yes, it was. Okay, I did. So I don't know. clinicals Joan Geismar made quite a few years ago now. That's kind of where I learned about clay pipes.

Chairman Smith: Thank you very much. Any other questions?

On behalf of the Park Commission are welcomed are definitely thank you for your time coming in tonight and we definitely appreciate your insight on the house ultimately, as we see in new sadly, the Bergen County Dutch sandstone is is truly an endangered species and we're losing them or being threatened. So all these stone houses that people can publicly visit play an important role in historical interpretation of the French rich history that we have here in Bergen County. So we definitely appreciate your time. Thank you very much.

Adam Strobel: Obviously, Mr. Chairman. We've had a number of comments. I don't know if I was taking notes of James probably mentally taking notes when other commissioners taking meeting minutes, but there's a sense that you want to transmit some of the thoughts to the county about what's really presented and then obviously, we'll review those and have a continuation of our dialogue.

Chairman Smith: I think that's fantastic. And to get to that conversation. Great. Thank you very much.

Chairman Smith: All right. Again, Adam, thank you very much. Was there anything else? For the county?

Adam Strobel: I did have a conversation with the engineering about that whole year the recall and now we're gonna we're gonna be talking about about the leveling of it. We talked previously had recommended that you know, adding stone dust or other materials, make it level. So there, they're following up with that as well. So hopefully we'll get to it. Finalize that.

Chairman Smith: Great. Thank you. Very much. Okay. Any other questions or comments for the County?

Deborah Powell: Right, there is some graffiti, new graffiti on the bridge. I don't know. If you know the county has the wherewithal to remove that. Okay. It's facing facing I think it facing the bridge right on beginning right. I didn't look at the other side.

Adam Strobel: Work this they happen to be down here too. There.

Eric Pain: Is it paint we wouldn't be do less than just paint it over? I think so.

Deborah Powell: I think there's a cleanser. I mean, that was one of the first things when we came here the the telephone guy saw us trying to clean up and he handed us a can of solvent.

Chairman Smith: Thank you very much for bringing that up Deborah. Any other questions.

# **B.** New Milford – Mayor Michael Putrino, Commissioner New Milford. Absent, no report.

# D. NJDEP, Eric Pain, Park Superintendant Representative.

## Eric Pain:

Okay, a few housekeeping items not necessarily part of my normal report. The pre winter service for the furnace is going to be conducted next week, Thursday or Friday, Thursday being a holiday probably Friday, but if they're available Thursday, why not? I'll come down and open up for him. It's the Limbach company that probably had the best understanding of the unit of any HVAC company that I've worked with for 20 years. They took the time to study the unit and research it before even taking the steps to identify what it is that they needed to do so I have every confidence that they're going to be our company to keep us in good shape until the time comes that we replaced it. As you may remember, they had pretty much recommended replacing it already, but they feel we can still use it. So we'll keep we'll keep doing so. The river rock, the show in good faith for the lack of funding that we have access to. I'm going to have the river rock completed with Greenwoods budget next week. I met with the contractor he's going to come out and do it and the park is going to cover it so maybe I won't get beat up this bad but when I don't have much to talk about with the funding. I do have on my calendar the Retreat Weekend I know there are still some holes in the back. We're going to try and address that before. Seems that I've reached the age where I have to take my glasses off to read now.

I did some research into the historical marker Deborah had asked about whether or not there was a standard throughout the state there is not there's currently no standard identified for historical markers statewide seems to vary by county. And I think it's something that certainly needs to be looked at. If we're going to have markers on state properties we should have some standard.

The Locust tree is still here, which still needs to be removed. The saga with Verizon and the redundant pole and PSE and G let's go back in time. 817 831 a nine four I had asked PSE and G for help. Verizon got involved and asked PSE and G to

relocate the service. So then I had to go back to PSE and G with a fancy form here. And back and forth. On the 27th, I submitted the form for formal requests to relocate the service to the other pole, which when we then allow Verizon once that service is off to remove it. If I had to guess I'd say it's probably a spring timeline but maybe maybe before.

I have two quotes for the exterior stone, just path and the meadow. Still need a third. And based on the threshold that they're coming in at I'm probably going to have to do one of those famous PV 120s Because they're over a certain threshold. \$34,040 and \$40,000 are what the two quotes came in at so far. And the second contractor had said that he wasn't so sure that land resource protection would approve it and another challenge that it was a former junkyard doesn't mean we can't still pursue it. The answer is no the answer's no. But when I get the third quote, we'll determine that I'll put that forward.

The rest of what I have to share really is all dependent on our funding.

The matter of the FY 18 balance still remains really hasn't changed from the last time I tried to explain it. Just this evening before the meeting. I sent an email to everybody that was on the email chamber for internal to DEP and here are my records. I was able to identify our balances \$1.52 And I'm hoping and in the accounting world that's usually not how it goes. But I'm hoping close enough is good enough.

But I'm hoping they will now To further complicate and delay the process. There was a key player that was out of work for an extended period of time she is now back. In other news Mark Texel is going to be reconnecting with us. Here there was were two staffing changes in parks, forests and historic sites. Rebecca Fitzgerald, formerly of Greenwood and then formally from there went to High Point she was selected as the new administrator for New Jersey Parks and Historic Sites that's the equivalent of the Director, they changed the title. Mark Texel is now the Administrator of the Office of Historic Sites. He plans to reach out to you regarding the funding and I filled them back in on exactly where I see that we are and hopefully he's gonna be able to take it from there. But, again, I don't have much information to offer as far as the release of the FY 19 And then 1.3 million. We've done everything that we've been asked we signed the interagency agreement and we submitted the project's whether or not the 1.3 is somehow tied to the FY 18 and 19 remains to be seen. I would certainly hope it is not because it was not. It was not discussed in that fashion when it was released. To begin with when the conversations were being held. Hopefully I have something else to report on the funding. And next month's meeting.

Chairman Smith: We definitely appreciate from beginning really appreciate everything that you've done. And just like those lines of communication and trying to you know, I've been involved with the email chains and seeing people like even during like COVID and everything else and just try it like what you've tried to move this football forward. And ultimately, I think, you know, we all want to move the football forward. Because like as you know, I've previously identified you know, you've talked about we've discussed you know, we have all these projects in place ready to go. Like they've asked, the funding is there now it just needs to maybe lightbulbs are probably too expensive now, but they could buy like an orange or 2% or close and we can move it along. Just point for clarification.

There is no official state marker program but as part of the 250 that is something that the New Jersey Historical Commission is looking at restarting. It's actually a potential joint marker program. Because there's also like it's another program that's marking African American historic sites as well. So the idea was to I think somebody had mentioned it like including altogether because I did actually I spoke to one of the representatives from the Historical Commission, because I did mention that the society has the original marker for the Steuben house that was put up in the 1930s it's, one of the 12 original markers, but in 2019-2020 the 250s committee was supposed to have somebody do this whole survey to see who has markers and the society had never received any contact as a follow up. I let the NJ Historical Commission know that we have this marker. And I was trying to work with Sewah to get them to get that paperwork in, letting them know that New Jersey also, as as a larger program doing markers that maybe they'll be more inclined to file paperwork. It's a great marker and it really shows the significance of the site or the site and the property and we want to definitely get that restored.

Eric Pain: The brush back. That's also I'm gonna get a quote for that too. I when I was down here, meeting with him about the rock. He's going to give me a quote for that.

Chairman Smith: Any other questions or comments? Yes, Deborah.

Deborah Powell: At the last meeting I asked about how was the visitation here reported and I went back and we have the car counter here, which is a new book bought it for it. Is how the NPS counts their visitation. I called Paterson Historic Site some time ago as them and I see that along the Old Mine Road and you know, the Delaware River, that's how they're counting it there. So I went through our records and so you know, obviously it gets pulled up during the winter months, so the count is only for five or six months. For 2020, 2021 and 2022. It's already up so it's, it's counting as you know, the vehicle coming in and the vehicle leaving so divided in half and I estimated those months where we did not have a report using a low number. And I can send you all those calculations, but the average is about 70,000 visitors [vehicles] a year ago cut it to the site.

Eric Pain: There a multiplier that you applied to like say, each vehicle or no cars generally a vehicle is occupied.

Deborah Powell: I was counting wheels. So what number would we use if a further revised the count?

Eric Pain: If you send me the raw data, I can apply the formula that we would use. And I don't know that we'll be able to break it down by weekend but there's you know, generally, four weekends in a month are our numbers for unmanned locations by car like during the day it's occupied two times on a on a weekend. It's could be four or five times. But it depends per area visible formula. It's somewhat complicated and I'm not sure how accurate it ends up being but it would definitely change the numbers in favor of visitors.

Deborah Powell: So we might be over 100,000, well over.

John Heffernan: Do you take into account the fact that most cars that come here don't drive over the counter?

Deborah Powell: Well, that's another unknown really because for instance, the Vintage Baseball most of the cars were parking in the parking lot and did not cross the car counter. But again, you know, estimating that I think we could say we have over 100,000 visitors a year. That is pretty impressive for this historic site.

Eric Pain: And some people could look at that and say, Oh, well, they were just turning around. But if you look at how another agency would report there's a counter on on Interstate 80. And the agency that responds will count those as their visitation. They're on Interstate 80.

Deborah Powell: What's fair is fair, right? So I can send this info to you Eric.

Chairman Smith: thank you very much for for sharing that.

# G. Bergen County Historical Society – Deborah Powell, Commissioner BCHS

At the Retreat event we had a unveiling of the musket, the Charleville musket that was founded in 1915 in the river in front of the Steuben House. It was x-rayed by Picatinny and it was conserved by Gary McGowan. So they were both at came for the unveiling. These guns were imported for the American cause by the thousands. Lafayette facilitated those purchases. The Conservation was funded by a private organization, Americana Corner. We received a \$6,000 grant from them plus people donating another \$2,500 to make up the whole amount. I was happy to see that even though Eric Pain could not be be there he was able to forward the invite to Mark Texel, the Assistant Director for the DEP and interpreter from Princeton battlefield came to to represent the DEP. The historian, Jeff Ranu from Picatinny Arsenal was thrilled, delighted with the event and spoke and Jim Smith spoke so did Scott Barone and Carol Restivo, the four of us really chaired the event together, each doing part of the work. John Heffernan was also there, John was shepherding some of the crowd to get them out of the way when [Washington and Greene and] the troops were coming over the bridge. [Park commissioners were invited.]

We have like 30-35 volunteers manning that event, you know, and I was here several nights setting up exhibits. I was vacuumed throughout the whole house. And you know, really wanted it to look good. And I was very, like I said, very glad that Mark came that was, just showed interest in the site. You know. I did approach seeing the Meadowlands Chamber was having a nonprofit event. Actually, I think it

took place today or tomorrow. So they're really the only tourism agency for the area. So I've been trying to develop several years now a relationship with them. And so part of it is even just getting you know, getting somebody to the site is gold, like a lot of people I think they think this like hokey maybe or something you know, like they they don't realize like what a great site this is, we have a fantastic collection and story here. So, this fellow I contacted them, they got right on it like they were a little embarrassed, I think so he's coming to the event on Sunday, a representative from the Meadowlands Chamber. And, you know, I expect you know, we'll have the whole site open. And I forgot to mention the mayor of River Edge. American Revolution. Like we have a lot of different stories to tell here. But the main connection is the rebel war I would say based on my experience, the new thing we have to talk about our kids we took down one of the cases of the reservoir artifacts is a bug it's candy kitchen, which is just something that happened to my family started with pouring candies from a family that inherited molds from both groups candy kitchen and Hackensack. And so I started after they passed away and then the molds went to the children which are the children of my age. I started buying molds on ebay so I have now 12 molds. So we poured in my kitchen on Sunday. And we have these for decorating like we hang them from a garland that's alone that break in the ceiling there. So they shine through the light, you know and then we have the exhibit and people fight over buying them even Jim actually asked to buy some already, but like, you know, so it's just like it sounds silly, but this is from another time when like this would be a treat for children that have a little animal shape, we're so far removed from that with our all the entertainment we have today. But there's like a dog here. It was candy. Yeah, sugar, corn syrup, and this watch cost \$100 to buy the mold for that. But it'll hang nice you know that a child on a horse pony or rocking horse, this but this is like the the how we really kind of got started because in the if you if you ever look at the Dutch paintings, Jan Steen is this really wonderful painter of the renaissance that the Dutch went through. Christmas is like a Dutch story really hit he in the center of the painting as a child with a bucket and we have a leather bucket. So we use that for decorating but in the bucket is a rooster candy restaurant a stick so we can actually recreate that 1660 painting in our in our exhibits in store retail. We reduced the retreat map that's up on the wall. And it was still legible at 11 by 14. So to keep reinforcing our story. And this is students will be able to afford buying the reduced copy.

## Chairman Smith:

I just wanted to add I mentioned that with Sinterklaas returning this weekend since the first time since pre COVID. I just wanted to also point out that the society still continued to do events during COVID. Some places did shut down. But we did work with Eric and state, county, federal regulations during that whole process to continue that going. I think that when you look at newspapers, and I think that the history component was kind of left out how that was affected, because I think that on one hand visitor experience or visitor some people have been going to parks more, but on the other hand, certain places have been closed. So how like has that had an

impact, but the Bergen County Historical Society continued throughout a whole process to make it relevant. And it was interesting to see these posts on social media and just like what kind of interest is sparked right that that Bergen County history, but in a different form can be formed, right so it's really nice and you reach people different ways.

## IX. Public Comment.

#### Jim Dusenbery:

I'm the blacksmith. My interest was sparked three weeks ago about the buildings in here. And I went back two minutes of 209 and we did extensive construction of the Campbell Christie house. And there are certain pictures that I guess we don't have anymore. There was a picture from the back the sign in the front and it it was phase one. After that there's nothing no information comes out of phase one so I don't know where and when. But it seems to have been the roof the structure in the roof. There was a mold within the building and had to be not used for several years. And I don't know if it was taken care of or not, because that's not in minutes. The other thing I came across was the the power of this group. And it was transferred from the DEP to us, meaning you people as to being that you're in charge of the whole place without state looking over your shoulder. There's several counts of there was 3#00,000 after you bought the land, which was a million something according to these emails, there was also \$300,000 for a visitor center which doesn't seem to appeared anywhere. And it just was concerning that there's a lot of money that's going around through the past. And James, you did explain to me some things which I can understand. There's a lot of workings on that have to go and if the money is there, it's got to be used somewhere you're gonna lose it. But the main thing that I'm concerned with is that every time you have a project, and I'll bring up a point, the allocation, how many years that we've asked to have the allocation roof done, and how long has it taken us to get it not been? That that's a concern for me because

we're getting bigger and bigger and bigger. And since I was in the maintenance busily, all my life, I'm just finding us slowly losing that concept of the buildings and we don't want to do that. We want to keep the place in honor of every person that came through this place, whether they were Indian, or civilian or military, and we want people in the area to know that and I'll bring up a point that Deborah has. I was blacksmithing. Sunday froze my butt off, but I was blacksmithing. And people actually came up to me and say, Oh, I never knew this place was here. And I don't know how to correct that. But as a board, I think we have to correct that. We've got to get something out there where and Deborah brought up two points where we weren't notified on either place of it seems to be huge organization that's in charge that they don't know we exist and that to me drop you went through two governors. From what I'm reading these things went through Corizine and Christie, thank you.

## Unknown

And one. Senator Weinberg was very instrumental on a lot of the stuff that I'm reading here. And it's fascinating reading. I've just been going back and back and back and back and further when this was created, and why it was created, and it doesn't seem that the state understands our point of view, and our strengths, and I think we have to get that across to the state in order for somebody to move. That's just a point that he made. And thanks for working on the barn. I know there's a lot of the work that has to be done to it. The one thing that I noticed looking at it is that the clappers go this way I've been looking at older barns that they've been redoing, and they're running them vertical, which I think would be a better thing to do, because that means the rain will run down as opposed to getting caught every inch of the way. Which is the problem with this barns that when the rain comes off of it, it sits and rots out the wood. So if you go vertical this way, like you would if it was a tobacco barn, they would have it vertical but it would be open. We want to close obviously. I think that's the way we should go. Thank you.

## Chairman Smith:

Thank you very much, Jim. Just real quick with the barn is based on the photographs at its original location in Washington Township, so I think it'd be very difficult to ultimately change the position of the siding with the out kitchen unfortunately well, with the funding being state funding, it does require three bids. The lowest bidder, unfortunately had passed away with a heart attack prior to the construction of that, and then one of the challenges then is getting a new bid, but then also to lift the release of the funds but once we're that funds being released, I think we'll be able to move that forward. As far as 2009 I think that report was updated in 2012. I want to 11 or 12 where the work was different if there was an older report, but I thought like a new report was generated with the workday. with the interior stabilization you mentioned.

## Jim Dusenbery:

I didn't see that report at all. I can't even find it's supposed to be a full 100 and some odd page report that's notified in there. Mr. John Heffernan was on that committee,

so was Deborah, so it's Kevin, according to the minutes that are reading, and it seems that nobody's ever received that 400 page report and I can't find it at all.

A.Strobel: That was the Historic Structure Report.

D. Powell: I would just say them that mold issue in the attic was the when it was when the house was rebuilt. You know, the roof was reinstalled in 1980. They put up like a like sort of a sheet rock material to lined the attic roof. And that even you can tell from his report [Clarke Canton Hintz Campbell-Christie House] he made that they are not recommending it. They were trying to achieve a clean environment but it created a mold situation. We experienced it in this house [Steuben House] even that they had installed an insulation material on the ceiling and it all had to be ripped out because it was creating the same kind of mold environment.
