Skirmishes took real lives and repeated foraging left families in want and fear and outrage. What was your gateway to HNBL?

We expect the coming years to be productive and meaningful ones, not only with the building of the Kevin Wright Museum, but because those who called Bergen County home were affected by

events all over the colonies. With the final victory at Yorktown not achieved until October 1781, people will be talking about the "250th anniversary" until 2031 at least! For trivia lovers, Semiquincentennial seems to be the favored term for the 250th.

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The Campbell-Christie House Restoration

The Campbell-Christie House has a new cedar shingle roof! Other exterior woodwork has also been completed after two-year long planning by the County of Bergen. The State Office of Historic Preservation weighed in on the plans. Consultant James Giresi of Clarke Caton Hintz also presented to BCHS and the Historic New Bridge Landing State Park Comission.

Further work needed was discovered during the project and replacement of all the windows are reportedly scheduled for next spring.

Removing all of the collections located on both the first floor and attic of the Campbell-Christie House into storage by BCHS volunteers was quite a task completed last spring.

We have a unique relationship where the building is owned by the County of Bergen



but located on BCHS property. BCHS retains all use and interpretation.

We are also delighted to have planning projects to begin with the release of funding from a state appropriation. Deliberation are underway with Richard Grubb and Associates with archaeology near the state owned, state historic sitethe Zabriskie Steuben House, with a focus on locations of outbuildings, interior discovery in back rooms, and possibly establishment of a formal garden. We will also be working with LAN Associates on entrance and parking lots redevelopment, other site planning, and water intrusion to the site and the Zabriskie Steuben House.



There is plenty going on besides BCHS Events. Every other Wednesday morning, the Buildings & Grounds volunteers plant, dig, weed, & create new projects, making the site lovely for visitors. It may be painting a bench or installing new fence rails, but they are invaluable to

Suspended from the Dwelling Room ceiling in the Steuben House at Sinter Klaas Day & during Christmas Concerts is a Kissing Ball. The tradition from the Middle Ages is a collection of evergreens of holly, ivy, & pine, with a sprig of misletoe in the center. Fruits suspended from the perimeter represent the five known planets at the time; Mercury, Venus, Mars, Jupiter, & Saturn. These were hung from the ceiling along passage ways in castles & houses, to render blessings & good luck to all who passed under.

The Bergen County Historical Society Library

is currently located at the Philip J. Ciarco Jr. Learning Center, 355 Main St., Hackensack, NJ. We house early Bergen County Family histories, published and bound books, pamphlets, special collections, manuscripts, visual postcards and photographs, maps and atlases, periodicals, as well as miscellaneous files.

Recently, we have collected pamphlets, postcards and newspaper clippings of the NJ Palisades Interstate Park currently on display in the Ciarco main lobby.

The Palisades' beauty and glorious scenery has always had great appeal and has roused private and public support for its conservation starting in the early

1900's. The Palisades have an interesting history from its ancient geology to recreational use today. Get a glimpse of the Library's Collection by viewing the display and learn more by visiting the library.

Providing Memory and Meaning in New Jersey's Storied Places

The State of New Jersey first officially marked its historic heritage by pacing a granite monument at the reburial site of john Hart, a signer of the Declaration of Independence, beside the Old School Baptist Meeting House a Hopewell in 1865. Between 1873 and 1921, the State authorized the placement of sixteen cemetery markers, battlefield tablets and monuments.

In 1874, the Legislature incorporated the Washington Association of New Jersey and appropriated \$5,000 annually towards the maintenance of Washington's Headquarters in Morristown. This historic site became the first National Historical Park in the United States when the State of New Jersey conveyed its title and interest therein to the Federal government on July 4, 1933.

Governor Joel Parker, of
Freehold, suggested erection of a
commemorative monument at
ceremonies marking the 99th
anniversary of the Battle of Monmouth on June 28, 1877. The Monmouth Battle Monument Association
was formed in October of that same
year. Daniel S. Schanck donated Monument Park, comprising 3-1/4 acres on a knoll
near Freehold's main thoroughfare. Governor
George B. McClellan laid the cornerstone on the
battle's 100th anniversary.

According to the design of architects Emelin T. Littell and Douglas Smythe, the Monmouth Battle Monument is made of polished New England granite, on a triangular base, with cannon at each angle. A large circular step above the base displays twenty medallion portraits of the prominent officers who participated in the battle. Above this step, the drumshaped base of the shaft bears five gunmetal bronze bas-relief panels,, each 5 feet high and 6 feet long, designed by Maurice J. Power, of the New York National Art Foundry, and executed by sculptor James

E. Kelly. These illustrate incidents from the battle. The column consists of three sections, joined with rings of bay leaves, crowned with a Composite capital and a statue of the Goddess of Liberty. Governor Leon Abbett unveiled the monument on November 13, 1884, before 20,000 people.

The Trenton Battle Monument Association was formed on May 7, 1884. A large brick carriage factory was demolished to make way for the monument, which marks the spot where, on Christmas Day, 1776, Captain Alexander Hamilton's battery of New York Artillery held of King and Queen Streets, proving a decisive factor in the battle that marked a turning-point in the War for American Independence. Ground was broken on September 20,

The Trenton Battle Monument from Know Your State, 1925. Designed by architect John H. Ducan. The Trenton Monument consists of a hollow Roman Doric column, fashioned of white Maine granite, with an observatory in the cap, crowned by a bronze statue of Gen. Washington, sculpted by William Rudolf O'Donovan. The monument rises 150 feet above street level and weights 4 million pounds. It was dedicated October 19, 1893, before a crowd of 20,000, including eight governors that were among the throng of dignitaries.

1891, and the cornerstone laid on December 26, 1891, the 115th anniversary of the battle. It was dedicated October 19, 2893. Governor George T. Werts made the closing address. Major-General W.J. Sewell commanded a military

parade of 5,000 soldiers for the occasion.

The State of New Jersey began acquiring and operating historic sites at the initiative of Governor Franklin Murphy, a member of several patriotic societies, including the Sons of the American Revolution. On April 2, 1902, the Legislature empowered a State commission to purchase and maintain the Old Indian King Tavern at Haddonfield. the provincial Assembly met here in 1777 and inserted the "state" for "colony" in all public documents. The State of New Jersey took possession of the old tavern on June 15, 1903. Renovations were made between 1908 and 1910.



AN ADDITIONAL COST

On the cold, drizzly morning of November 20, 1776, a mere four months after the Second Continental Congress declared us to be an independent nation, the mighty British army mounted an invasion of Bergen County. Their goal was to capture the American garrison at Fort Lee. The garrison's only means of escape lay across a small wooden drawbridge at New Bridge Landing at what today is now River Edge, Teaneck. New Milford.
